>>>>ATTENTION <>>> A Special notice to all members

Our family is growing by leaps and bounds. One of the most important issues addressed by Clan Gillean USA is that we are an organization focused on service to you, our members. Our attempt is to promote our common bond – our heritage through our newsletter, our presence at Celtic Festivals and Highland Games, and by our focus on education.

However, although inflation has been constant, our dues structure has not changed in approximately ten years.

At the request of the Financial Committee, the Executive Committee presented to the AGM a proposal to increase our dues. This proposal was approved by acclamation.

Therefore, effective January 1, 2004, our dues will be increased as follows:

* For an ordinary membership:

Until December 31, 2003, the annual dues are \$15.00. Effective January 1, 2004, the annual dues will be \$25.00

For a lifetime membership:

Per our Constitution and Bylaws, the cost of a lifetime membership is equivalent to the sum of dues for a ten year period. Therefore, until December 31, 2003, the fee for a lifetime membership is \$150.00. Effective January 1, 2004, the fee for a lifetime membership is \$250.00.

The new member's fee of \$15.00 will remain the same.

With the increased funds, we will be in a better capacity to serve you. We can attend more games. We can produce a larger, more informative newsletter. And we can work toward being the world leaders in promoting and preserving our heritage that we all strive to be.

MEETING

2:00 P.M. – OCTOBER 18, 2003

CALL TO ORDER: Vice President Claude Hicks, of Macon, GA, called the Annual General Meeting to order at 2:00 p.m.

QUORUM CHECK: A quorum check of at least 15 members in good standing was established by review of the signed visitor's log.

PRESIDENT'S OPENING REMARKS: Claude Hicks welcomed all members in attendance. He informed the quorum of President Clarence Greek's hip replacement surgery, and of Mr. Greek's post surgery fracture of his femur. Then Mr. Hicks, per our bylaws, stated that he would chair the meeting in the place of Mr. Greek.

APPOINTMENT OF PARLIAMENTARIAN: Patrick Maclean, of Huntersville, NC, was appointed parliamentarian.

MINUTES OF THE 2002 MEETING were presented by Secretary Betsy McLean. Motion to approve was made by Ephraim McLean and seconded by Kirk Lane. The motion was carried by acclamation.

OLD BUSINESS:

Mr. Hicks informed the members in attendance that our Treasurer, David McLane, of Garland, TX, was not able to attend the meeting because of surgery. Mr. Hicks stated that because of his health, and since his term ends this year, Mr. McLane requested that he not be reelected as Treasurer. Throughout the past year, Mr. McLane has been preparing records to be transferred to Membership chairman, Jim Waddell, of Knoxville, TN, in preparation of his election to the office of Treasurer. Mr. Waddell was unable to attend because of prior commitments at his place of employment, therefore, his wife, Kathy Waddell attended in his place.

NEWSLETTER:

I am pleased to report that in the 2002-2003 fiscal year, there have been four quarterly issues of *The Pipings* each published within one week of scheduled circulation date. These four issues have allowed a period of experimentation in the hopes of presenting the best quality of newsletter for the lowest cost possible.

We owe tremendous gratitude to Golden Corral Corporation, based in Raleigh, NC. Golden Corral has agreed to allow your editor full use of their copier for the purpose of printing the newsletter, at no cost, which allows Clan Gillean USA to publish each issue of The Pipings in its current format (using a premium 11 by 17 inch paper with a 92 brightness) at an average cost of \$285.00 per 600 copies. Estimates at other printing/copying establishments for standard 8 1/2 by 11 inch paper varies from \$700.00 per issue. I have investigated the possibility of a color newsletter, but unfortunately, I would have to use other resources for copying purposes, and color copies would cost a minimum \$1.00 per page - that would increase the cost to a minimum of \$7,450.00 per issue in the format that is now being used.

As our clansmen are becoming accustomed to a regular newsletter, more news is being submitted for possible inclusion. I cannot stress enough how important these submissions are to our newsletter. We are a large clan that is spread worldwide. In most instances, the only way we can be absolutely positive that information gets to our members is to print the information in *The Pipings*. In addition to submitting news to your editor, I request feedback. Please inform your editor of any topics that might be addressed in the newsletter. This will allow your editor to develop a more informative newsletter, based specifically on

In conclusion, I promise that in the next year, there will be more improvements in the format of *The Pipings*. I also promise that in the coming year, there will be four quarterly issues to be published as close to the printed publication date as possible.

REGIONS:

REGION 5 REPORT

The highland games season this year in New England enjoyed better weather on the days of scheduled events attended by me. The Maclean tent was set up at five games in New England and was represented at an event in Prince Edward Island, Canada, at which the Chief was in attendance.

The Rhode Island Heritage Festival on May 17 was at a new venue this year and was well attended. A few Macleans appeared, mostly my own family.

June 28 was the date of the above-mentioned festival at Summerside, P. E. I., Canada, where a Maclean tent (the only clan tent) was set up and manned by Roddie MacLean, President of the Island Clan Association, a subsidiary of Maclean Atlantic. Attendance was fairly brisk. Sir Lachlan was kept busy signing autographs and posing for pictures.

Maine Highland Games on August 16 was favored by a sparkling summer day. Twenty-four Macleans registered. John R. MacLean, our subconvener from New Hampshire, assisted me at the tent. I have been unable to recruit a Maine convener.

Queechee, Vermont, on August 23, was our next clan appearance. Queechee is a favorite of many clans, a lovely setting in the Green Mountain State. It was a beautiful day, nineteen Macleans found their way to our tent to discuss McLeanery.

The New Hampshire Highland Games, held on

September 19 to 21, is the largest in New England. Upwards of 35,000 people attended on Saturday, the 20th. (The ATM machine ran out of money.) This was a change of venue for these games, and there was some question as to what the response would be. This is always a big Maclean tent registration, and seventy-four registered this year, including seventeen members and a life member.

Scotland, Connecticut will be the last tent set up for 2003, on October 12. I expect we will have a dozen or so registrants who generally appear – if the weather cooperates, maybe a few more. At least the colors will be shown!

Motion to approve the reports was made by Patrick Maclean, seconded by Ephraim McLean, and carried by acclamation.

Mr. Hicks recognized the appointment, by our President, Clarence Greek, of Kathy Waddell of Knoxville, TN, to chair the membership committee.

NEW BUSINESS:

ELECTIONS:

Vice President Claude Hicks, at the request of the Nominating Committee, presented the following:

- 1) For the office of President, for a 3 year term ending with the AGM in the year 2006, Past President Kirk Lane was recommended.
- 2) For the office of Secretary, for a 2-year term ending with the AGM in the year 2005, Betsy McLean was recommended for a second term.
- 3) For the office of Treasurer, for a 3-year term ending with the AGM in the year 2006, Jim Waddell was recommended.
- 4) For the office of Director Region 5, a 5-year term ending with the AGM in the year 2008, John C. MacLean from the State of Rhode Island was recommended for another term.

Mr. Hicks clarified that a two-year term for the office --continued on page 6

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of Secretary was required per our Constitution and bybylaws to allow the terms of office for our Executive Committee to be staggered. This one time shortened term will make that correction.

Motion was made to close and accept nominations by Ephraim McLean, seconded by Patrick Maclean, and the motion was carried.

Motion was made to elect by acclamation by Ephraim McLean, seconded by Gerald Larkey, and the motion was carried.

INCREASE OF DUES:

The current structure of dues has been in place for about ten years, without change. Inflation rates during the past ten years have shown to be tremendous. In order to produce a more polished newsletter, assist with convening tents at Highland Games, and provide more funds to promote Clan Gillean USA and its interests, the Financial Committee proposed that we increase dues effective January 1, 2004. It was requested that annual dues be increased from \$15.00 per year to \$25.00 per year, with Lifetime dues being increased from \$150.00 to \$250.00 (a total equivalent to ten years' dues as designated in the Constitution and Bylaws). It was stated that the new member fee of \$15.00 would remain the same.

Motion was made to approve the dues increase by Ephraim McLean, seconded by Gerald Larkey, and the motion was carried.

NOTIFICATION OF GAMES SCHEDULES:

The Executive Committee decided that more structure was needed to organize the annual games schedule. This structure is needed to prepare the budget, to prevent duplication of scheduling, and to simplify reimbursements. Therefore, a declaration was made by order of the Executive Committee that it is required that by February 1, 2004, each person convening a tent must submit to the Secretary, in writing, a schedule of planned games for the period beginning February 1, 2004 and ending February 1, 2005. This schedule must include the name, date, time, location, and cost of each game planned, along with (if possible) a brochure or ad copy for that game. If a schedule is not submitted by February 1, 2004,

reimbursement of that game will not be authorized. The only exception to this rule is in the case of a new game that has not previously been advertised. In this case, the convener must contact a member of the Executive Committee with a request to convene that game.

PRESENTATION OF CERTIFICATES:

For exceptional service to Clan Gillean USA, it was agreed by acclamation to present Certificates of Appreciation to the following members:

Bob Forsman, of Ft. Pierce, FL, was recognized. After he told everyone of the special care given to him by fellow member Rod McLean Barken, Mr. Forsman presented to Mr. Barken a special gift – a flask, engraved in Gaelic, the words "Tapadh leat, mo charaid, which means "Thank you, my friend".

Ephraim McLean invited all attendees to his home the evening of the AGM for dinner and fellowship.

Kathy Waddell asked everyone to join her in wishing Claude Hicks a happy birthday.

PRESIDENT'S FINAL REMARKS

President Kirk Lane, who thanked Mr. Hicks for presiding over the meeting for Clarence Greek, made final remarks. Mr. Lane said that when he was asked to accept the nomination for this term as President, he would only accept if Mr. Greek would accept an appointment as Ambassador at Large for Clan Gillean USA. He thanked Mr. Greek and David McLane for all of their sacrifices for the organization.

He stated that if anyone is interested in convening a tent at a game, to please contact him. Mr. Lane informed everyone of the prepared tent kit that is available.

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Mr. Lane also stated that Clan Gillean USA is the largest Maclean organization in the world. He said "As we grow, we can be leaders. We need to do everything we can to prepare to pass this on to our children, so that they can know what their heritage is all about, where they came from, so that they can have roots, and so they can move forward. If you don't have children, find a niece or a nephew and work with them. They are our future."

After a welcome to new members, and a heartfelt thanks, at 2:45, Mr. Lane declared the meeting adjourned.

It is with deep sadness that I report the loss of yet another member of my family...your editor

Jasper Ray "Jack" McLean, 76, of Angier, NC, died Monday, November 10, 2003 at the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Fayetteville, NC.

The son of the late Noland and Ruby McLean, Jack was born on 28 March, 1927 in Willow Spring, NC. Jack was the eldest of seven children, raised during the Great Depression on a tobacco farm. A U.S. Navy Veteran of WWII, he served aboard the submarine USS Sea Leopard (SS-483). He returned to the farming life, but spent most of his adulthood working in construction as a grading contractor. Jack was a quiet, unassuming man whose greatest concern was other people.

Jack was survived by son and daughter-in-law, Michael R. and Cathy McLean of Angier, NC; sisters Betty M. Stewart of Buies Creek, NC, and Sue M. Mason of Garner, NC; and brother, Russell T. McLean of Angier, NC. Granddaughter Amanda McLean of Smithfield, NC; Grandson Michael McLean and wife LeAnn, of Norcross, GA; and great-granddaughter Mika Lynn McLean also survived him.

His wife, Ruby Williford McLean, and brothers Carlton, Marvin, and Robert McLean preceded Jack in death.

The funeral service was held at 11:00 am, 13 November, 2003 at Kennebec Baptist Church. He was buried between his wife and his parents at the Kennebec Baptist Church cemetery.

From New England...

The first games on the schedule May 17, 2003 were at the Rhode Island Scottish Festival at the fairgrounds in Richmond, RI. The weather finally cooperated for this event! We had a beautiful sunny day. This was the first year at the venue, and there was a large public turnout – not a lot of Macleans, about a dozen.

Of particular interest to our family was the fact that my son, called Jack, was competing in the Grade Four bagpipe competition, the second time he had ever competed. His first competition was in April of this year at the New Hampshire Arts Festival where he got two golds, a silver, and a bronze medal. At Richmond, RI, he was successful in the pibroch event, winning a bronze medal.

The second Scottish event we attended was at the Piping School at Summerside, Prince Edward Island, Canada. Our family had decided to make a visit to "the island" as it is known to Canadiens from that area of the Atlantic Provinces. Jack had entered the piping competition and our family would be there to support him.

We knew that our Chief, Sir Lachlan, would be

attending as part of the international Gathering of the Clans in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and as we had all had met him at the Clan Gathering at Duart Castle it would be a good opportunity to greet him on his arrival in Canada. Roddy MacLean, President of the P.E.I. Association of the Maclean Atlantic Branch had arranged for a Maclean tent. When the Chief arrived my family, as well as Greg MacLean, Massachusetts Convener of Clan Gillean, was there to greet him. He recognized us all as having been on Mull the previous year.

Sir Lachlan was escorted by Roddy MacLean and after spending a couple of hours, the Chief, followed by a small contingent of Macleans, headed to Lot 16 where a reception in the church, the laying of a wreath at the grave of two early Maclean emigrants, and a collation were to be held.

It was a very clannish gathering. The church choir was made of Macleans. There was a special song, "The Chief Came Across" sung, and he was presented with mementos of his visit. A bountiful collation served by the church ladies was appreciated by the large gathering of Macleans. Due to his tight schedule the Chief was forced to cut short his visit and headed out for Nova Scotia. Our family headed back to Canoe Cove to our cottages, all in a happy mood somewhat elated by the day's events.

The third games we attended was the Maine Highland Games at Thomas Point Beach, Brunswick, Maine. Betty and I always start out on Thursday to set up on Friday in readiness for Saturday. We camp on the grounds which makes it easier to transport the tent equipment, literature, etc. This year twenty-four Macleans registered at the tent. A few were Clan Gillean members but most not, being happy to hear about Maclean history.

Quechee, Vermont was the site of the August 23 Scottish Festival, and the fourth we attended. This is a very lovely spot in the Green Mountain State. There were nineteen registrants at the tent, more than usual here. The weather was ideal, sparkling sunshine, with a cool breeze. Betty and I stated that on another day we would come back to enjoy the area.

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England are the New Hampshire Highland Games. This year the games changed its venue from Loon Mountain, Lincoln, NH to Hopkinton, NH fairgrounds. There were some that questioned the move but judging from the turnout it seemed a wise decision.

The Maclean tent played host to many people on Saturday and Sunday. 

Presentation to Lady Elizabeth Maclean

Lieutenant Colonel Donald MacLean, President Clan Maclean Association, presented a painting to Lady Elizabeth at the London Association Dinner at the Caledonian Club, London on Friday 7th February 2003. The following is an extract from his presentation speech:

"For those of you who didn't come to Mull last June for the International Gathering, I can report that it was, despite indifferent weather, very successful and great fun. It did involve a great deal of work during the two years leading up to the Gathering and during the week itself, but it was all worth while. The one piece of business we couldn't deal with on that occasion was our plan to make a presentation to Lady Elizabeth. I had hoped to do this on the steps of Duart Castle but sadly her Ladyship could not be with us. While thinking about Lady Elizabeth, I was struck by three things:

- 1. She became a Maclean when she married in June 1941. This was 12 years before the London Association was formed.
- 2. She has led a very interesting and challenging life. From her young days at the Mann family home at Ascot (full of famous sportsmen), through the war years and peacetime as an army wife and then with our late Chief during his Scouting period and latterly, the Royal Service years.
- 3. She clearly has a great love of Mull and Duart Castle.


I personally first met Lady Elizabeth in 1980. I had just returned from abroad and decided to visit Duart Castle for the first time. It was late April and the Castle was not yet open to the public. Initially I looked around the outside of the Castle then poked my head into the quadrangle. An upstairs window flew open and a lady in an apron and carrying a feather duster, asked me rather imperiously what I was doing there. I explained that I was a Maclean and had come to visit the Castle not realising that it wasn't yet open. There was a slight pause and this lady announced that the Chief would see me. To cut a long story short, I was given a conducted tour finishing up with two large schooners of sherry. The last thing Lord and Lady Maclean needed that day, when they were preparing the Castle for summer opening, was a visit --continued on page 12

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from me. Their kindness and generosity at this first meeting left a big impression to the extent that, when I was asked two or three years later, to help plan and organise the 1986 Clan Gathering at Duart, I had no hesitation in agreeing, and I've been involved ever since.

We, the Clan Maclean Association, wished to recognise Lady Elizabeth's extraordinary service to the Clan over the past 60 plus years. Therefore, we commissioned Alastair Campbell of Airds, a well-known water colourist, to paint something appropriate for her. He was delighted to do this and chose to paint a view of Mull from Ganavan Sands (just north of Oban). Although a Campbell, the artist is redeemed in part, because his Grandmother was a Maclean!!

Lady Elizabeth, it is with great pleasure that I present this painting to you from the Clan Maclean as a token of our admiration and affection."

A Gaelic Lesson!

With a special thank you to life member Anne Landin, we will present a Gaelic lesson in each issue of The Pipings. As you read the lesson, notice that you will find first, the Gaelic words, second the English translation, third, a phonetic pronunciation, and, fourth, for the vocabulary, the masculine or feminine tense. Enjoy!

Gaelic Lesson #2

Conversation:

Nach eil i blath? (isn't it warm?) nock ell ee blah

Tha, ach tha i fliuch. (Yes, but it is wet) Ha, ack ha ee floock

Tha, chan eil i tioram, gu dearbh. (Yes, it isn't dry, indeed) Ha, hahn yell ee cheerum, goo jarav.

Note that Gaelic does not answer a question with words equivalent to no and yes. A question is answered using the verb that was used. Chan eil is the negative form of the verb to be. Nach eil is the negative question form (is it not?).

Vocabulary: baile (town, village) bahluh (m)

bahnyuh (m) Bainne (milk) Balach (boy) bahluck (m) bahtuh (m) Bàta (boat) Beag (small, little) beck Beagan (a few, a little) beckun Bean (woman, wife) ben (f) Breagha (lovely, beautiful) breehuh Briogais (trousers) brackish (f) Bròg brohk (f) (shoe)

It is difficult to write a good phonetic pronunciation. Different people may give different interpretations to the sounds of words, but this is my version. Since there are sounds in Gaelic that don't occur in English, I can only approximate the pronunciation in writing in some cases. A ch in Gaelic is not really like a ck in English but is softer. Remember to lengthen the words that have accents.

In Gaelic there is no word for "a" or "an". The indefinite noun is written with no article. Definite articles (to express the English word "the") are "an" or "am". The an changes to am before nouns beginning with a b,f,m or p, just as we change "a" to "an" in English before a vowel.

Pronouns:

e (he) (aaay - rhymes with Fay, lay, bay) i (she) (eeee)

Learn these simple sentences:

Tha i breagha an-diugh. (It (the weather) is pretty today) Ha ee breehuh un jew.

Am bheil am bainne fuar? (Is the milk cold?) Um veil um bahnyuh foo-ur?

Chan eil am ba\ta beag. (The boat is not small) Hahn yell um baahta beck.

Nach eil am bro\g fluich? (Isn't the shoe wet?)
Nock ell um brohk floock?

Remember that the verb goes first in a sentence.

What in the world do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans and especially the partridge who won't come out of the pear tree have to do with Christmas?

From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their church.

Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality, which the children could remember:

The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ
