

New President Elected at AGM

WEAPONS OF CLAN MACLEAN BY ROBERT FORSMAN

The Scottish Pikemen

The word, **pike**, (Gaelic *gaedus*, later, *pic*) almost always refers to a spear carried by foot soldiers, and used en masse. It tends to be long – the *sarissa* of the Macedonian phalanxes of Alexander was said to have been from 17' to 22'. Some references to the pikes used to protect musketeers have them at 26'. The Swiss gained a reputation of invincibility for some 200 years based on their combination of 15' - 20' pikes, and the halberd, a long hafted combination axe/spike weapon.

The preferred wood in Europe for spear shafts was almost universally accepted as ash. Indeed, the Norse word, aesc was a kenning, a poetic word, for spear. However, other woods might be used, such as oak, linden, or other hardwoods. Butt caps might be present to prevent splintering of the butt.

The original pike of the schiltrons was anywhere from 9' – 12', with a variety of head shapes, many made by local smiths. This might have been the norm since the time of the Picts, who were known to have used masses of pikemen. However, a relatively small head eventually came to be preferred, for its efficiency in penetrating mail, or the joints in plate armor. The quality of the socket varied widely, but most would have been made to withstand hard use. Languets, the metal straps running back from the socket along the shaft, might be welded to the socket, separate, or missing. When present, they protected the shaft from sword/axe cuts. Butt caps for pikes would not normally be pointed, since they could wound men in the second or third ranks if they were forced back, or up, from impact.

The tactical use of pikes did not change much over the centuries, but the Swiss and the Scots were the prime examples from the 14th Century onwards. Against enemy footmen, the front three or four ranks would level their pikes at shoulder height, hands gripping the shaft rather widely apart, so as to deliver a slightly downward thrust, according to Professor Oman. With the momentum of the charge, there were few troops who could withstand such an attack without extra support. If a stalemate did occur, as against another body of pikemen, the front ranks might open up for the halberdiers to come through. This was often the bloodiest phase of the battle. The Scots' schiltrons were often weak in this aspect, although Lochaber & Jeddart axes would have been ideal in the role.

Imagine, if you will, an issue of *The Pipings* containing an article about the election of Patrick R. Maclean

ON THE TARTAN TRAIL

Lochcarron is famous for its wonderful tartans, knits and cashmere products. The mill is located in the village of Selkirk, in the border region of Scotland. This location is fairly new for Lochcarron, as it was previously housed in several buildings in Galashiels.

There are tours offered at various times, but the best time to visit is on Friday. The mill operates on a four day work week, with workers putting in ten hour shifts per day. Since we visited on a Friday, the mill wasn't operating and we were able to walk all through the work area. Our guide was "Alwyn", a very knowledgeable gentleman who patiently answered all of our questions.

Since Lochcarron dyes all of its own yarns, they are able to have consistency in color batches. The loom is set up for a particular tartan, and some tartans are much more complex than others. The loom master runs the loom for about twelve inches, then stops the loom and does a thread count. If there is an error, he is able to correct it before more tartan is woven. Lochcarron doesn't sell "seconds"; if several yards of tartan are woven with an error, workers either pull out a thread or weave in a missing thread by hand. Needless to say, it is very laborious! This also helps explain why tartan is so expensive.

It was quite a sight to see shelf after shelf full of beautiful tartans. The showroom was full of beautiful scarves, sweaters and throws. There were two changing rooms that were shaped like tents. I was thrilled to see that one of these tents was entirely constructed of our beautiful Weathered Maclean tartan! I purchased a Pendleton skirt several years ago that I fell in love with the moment I saw it. I hadn't realized at the time that it was Weathered Maclean. We made a few purchases (of course), and then moved on to the tea room for much needed refreshment.
